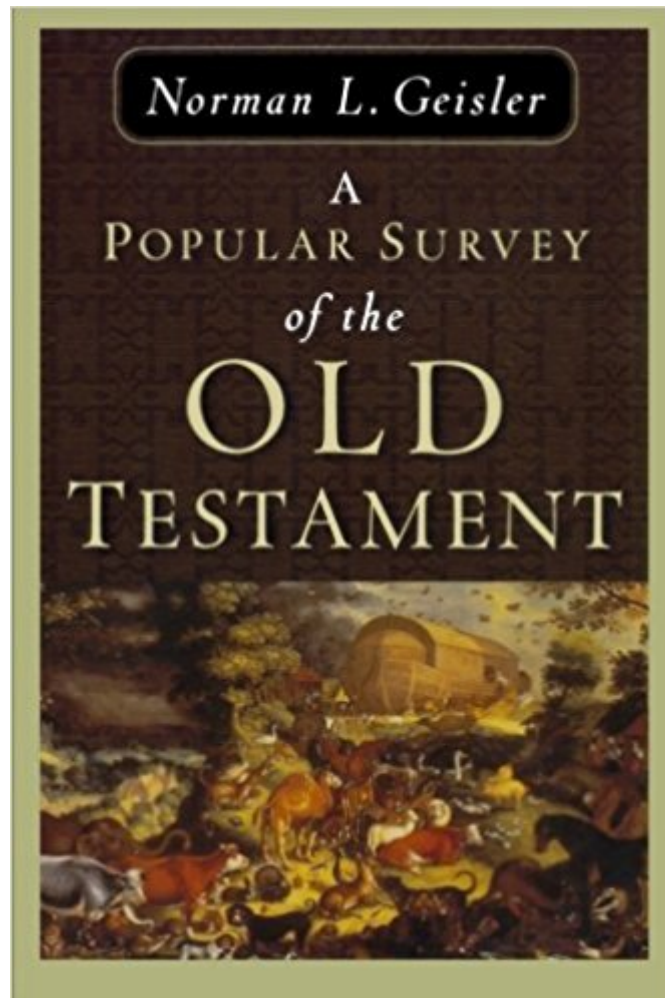

Norman L. Geisler (Ph.D., Loyola University of Chicago) has taught at top evangelical schools for over fifty years and is distinguished professor of apologetics and theology at Veritas Evangelical Seminary in Murrieta, California. He is the author of more than seventy books, including the Baker Encyclopedia of Christian Apologetics.

Christ is the central message of the OT, and Geisler draws this out of each book. Each book has a historical, doctrinal, and Christological message. It is very brief, so it is good for average reader to get a brief overview. If looking for an analytical, and in depth commentary of each book, then should look elsewhere, as this book is a survey, and that is what you get.

Geisler's book is easy to read. He provides a very good survey of each book of the Old Testament. He tells you who wrote each book, when they were written, to whom the book was written; and the historical, doctrinal and Christological purposes for each book. It helped me to better grasp the Old Testament as a whole. Most important, this book helped me to see Jesus throughout the Old Testament.
