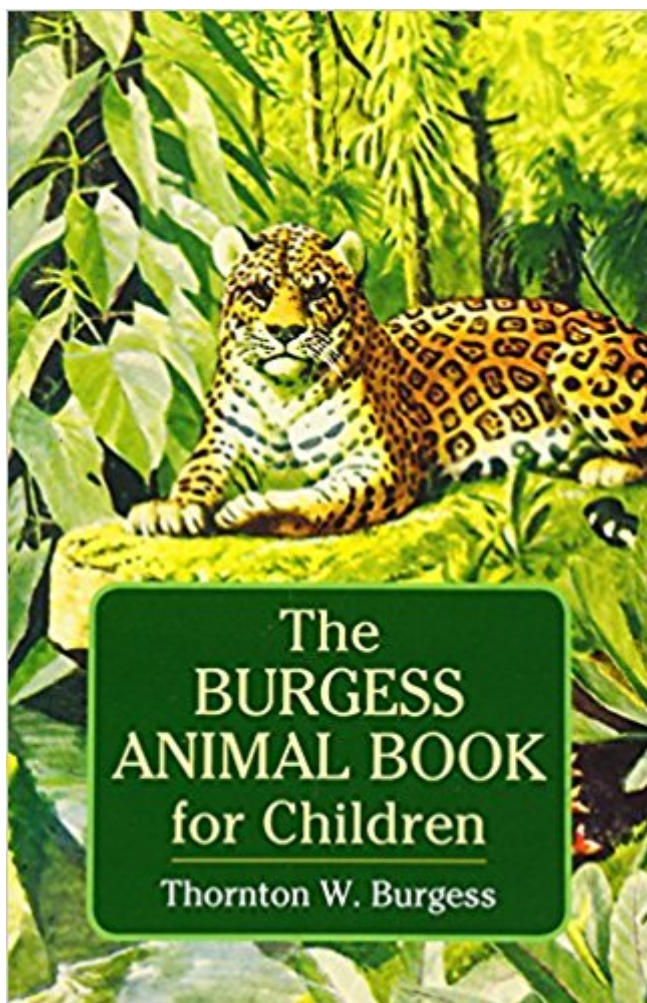

Author and conservationist Thornton W. Burgess (1874–1965) wrote thousands of animal stories for children, starting with the 1910 publication of *Old Mother West Wind*. Burgess's tales convey his fascination with wildlife and his concern for nature, teaching gentle lessons about ecology and respect for the environment.

Ahhh Burgess books. They are classics. These books are filled with facts about animals, written in

story form. True "living books." They have substance, which many modern books for children lack. I loved reading these when I was a kid, and have enjoyed reading them with my children. Great for kids that love animals and great literature!

Haven't finished it yet, but my immediate reaction is that this will be a disappointment to most people who are fascinated by the tales of Peter Rabbit. It seems to have been written as a teaching aid for children about different species of the same kind of animal, taught by Mother Nature. Peter is challenged to find out more about his cousins in the rabbit and hare family and is subsequently joined by others to find out about cousins they did not know they had. I will finish reading this later, but obviously it has not been for me a "can't put it down" spellbinder. -Dan

And such a wonderful experience to read Mr. Burgess's descriptions of our childhood friends: Peter Rabbit, Happy Jack the Grey Squirrel, Reddy Fox, Paddy Beaver, Unc' Billy Possum, and very many others whom we wouldn't remember as easily: Shadow the Weasel, Glutton the Wolverine, Tufty the Lynx, Forkhorn the Mule Deer, Bugler the Elk, and more and more! I was exclaiming aloud as I rediscovered those old friends that Mr. Burgess described in such detail. This book is as relevant today as when it was first published in 1910. It's a read aloud book. Though it would be best to have a hard copy with the illustrations that were included in the original book. Such a fun read!

Let me stress that the 3 stars are because the service from the people selling the book was first rate. What made this hardback book only "ok" is that there are NO illustrations in it. LOL and some

of the other reviewers were complaining about only having black & white photos!? Yes, the Burgess stories are excellent, of course, but illustrations were a part of the original issue. Disappointed!

I'm assuming my granddaughter is enjoying these, but I just wish they had a table of contents with each CD so we could tell where we wanted to go to listen to what story.
