

I wish that this had been the first book I read when I started making motion media. It would have laid a foundation that would have made it easier to develop my skills. This is a basic book on editing. After explaining the editing process, it offers descriptions of the kinds of visual and audio materials the editor will be presented with, like shot descriptions and ambiance. Next the author explains how to select the best shots and then when to cut and why. Bowen follows with a discussion of transitions and the kinds of edits, like screen position and form edits. A discussion of editing features, like rendering, follows. The last chapters are an aggregate of a lot of tips and techniques for editing. There are appendices describing the members of a crew, references and even a short sample script as well as a glossary. All of this material is related to explaining the conventional tools and methods of motion media. Bowen recognizes that there may be exceptions and experiments but that communication to audiences requires an agreed upon language, which this book documents in clear, simple language. The author does not discuss any specific tools that an editor might use for editing, like Avid or Premiere. Even though he occasionally will refer to an editing function, it is in generic terms. This makes the book a nice companion to a manual that teaches the technical side of a non-linear editor. This is a companion book to *Grammar of the Shot* which of necessity has some similar material like descriptions of shots. The photographic illustrations in the book reproduced poorly but are more than adequate for their purposes. There is a companion website. Videos there repeat some instructional material, and while they are, I daresay, cute, they don't add anything to the book text. Supposedly there are downloadable and editable scenes available, but I didn't find them. Even though I've read many books and taken courses in editing, (as well as edited videos), the book presented concepts I had not encountered, and helped to provide clearer conceptual organizing of the editing process. It's a good place to start to learn how to edit motion media. Note: The publisher provided me with a review copy of this book at no charge.

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
