

# The Invisible Orientation: An Introduction To Asexuality



## **Synopsis**

What if you weren't sexually attracted to anyone? A growing number of people are identifying as asexual. They aren't sexually attracted to anyone, and they consider it a sexual orientation - like gay, straight, or bisexual. Asexuality is the invisible orientation. Most people believe that "everyone" wants sex, that "everyone" understands what it means to be attracted to other people, and that "everyone" wants to date and mate. But that's where asexual people are left out - they don't find other people sexually attractive, and if and when they say so, they are very rarely treated as though that's okay. When an asexual person comes out, alarming reactions regularly follow; loved ones fear that an asexual person is sick, or psychologically warped, or suffering from abuse. Critics confront asexual people with accusations of following a fad, hiding homosexuality, or making excuses for romantic failures. And all of this contributes to a discouraging master narrative: there is no such thing as "asexual". Being an asexual person is a lie or an illness, and it needs to be fixed. In *The Invisible Orientation*, Julie Sondra Decker outlines what asexuality is, counters misconceptions, provides resources, and puts asexual people's experiences in context as they move through a very sexualized world. It includes information for asexual people to help understand their orientation and what it means for their relationships, as well as tips and facts for those who want to understand their asexual friends and loved ones.

This is such a good book, and high time such a book was published. If you identify as asexual or know someone who does, or even if you don't know of anyone who is, or don't know what I'm talking about, you should read this book. In fact if you are at all interested in how humans relate to each other, you should read *The Invisible Orientation*. This is a comprehensive look at a neglected sexual orientation, written in a way that's sensitive to all the nuances and forms asexuality can take. Asexuality is a natural, in-born orientation in something around 1% of the population. The term "asexual" when applied to sexual orientation means that one isn't sexually attracted to anyone or experiences no sexual desire. It's been so unrecognized, until about 10 or 12 years ago, that there wasn't even a name for it. People who experienced asexuality didn't know they weren't alone until the Internet began to make it possible to connect and realize there were others out there who experienced the same thing. Julie Sondra Decker provides lots of information here, and in an organized way that's accessible and highly readable, with sensitivity to the many issues that arise when one sets out to define or explain asexuality. She includes numerous Internet and reading resources. Highly recommended.

I used to introduce myself, when someone inquired, which was not often as "Bisexual by nature, Asexual by choice, because, although in my youth I had experimented with the various possibilities, I'm currently in my late 50's and never had an orgasm. This book is teaching me that it ISN'T something to hide away, it's just how I am. (I am also convinced that my late father passed this one down to me, along with several other genetic traits.) But that's okay, it's all me, and maybe, just maybe, I'm not needing to fix it. I really like that idea.
