

Synopsis

Frank Pollard awakens in an alley, knowing nothing but his nameâ "and that he is in great danger. Having taken refuge in a motel, he wakes again only to find his hands covered in blood. As far as he knows, he's no killer. But whose blood is this, and how did it get there? Over the next few days Frank develops a fear of sleep, because each time he wakes he discovers strange objects in his hands and pocketsâ "objects far more frightening than blood. Husband-and-wife detective team Bobby and Julie Dakota specialize in high-ticket corporate security investigations, but when a distraught and desperate Frank Pollard begs them to watch over him, they can't refuse. Pencil in two more best sellers for Koontz, author of *Strangers* (LJ 4/15/86), *Watchers* (LJ 3/1/87), and *Lightning* (LJ 1/88). Originally written under the pseudonym "Leigh Nichols" and published as a Pocket Books paperback in 1979, *The Key to Midnight* (#8 on the 11/1/89 LJ Prepub Best Sellers List) tells the story of expatriate songstress Joanna Rand, owner of a trendy Japanese night club in Kyoto. When vacationing private eye Alex Hunter recognizes Joanna as the victim of an unsolved ten-year-old kidnapping case, the tale takes an eerie turn into the all-too-real science of mind control and psychological conditioning. In Koontz's latest offering, *The Bad Place* (#20 on the 11/1/89 LJ Prepub Best Sellers List; Previewed in Prepub Alert, LJ 9/1/89), amiable Frank Pollard hires a husband-and-wife detective team to watch over him while he sleeps. Every time poor Frank nods off, he awakens covered with blood and in possession of some decidedly weird objects. Soon, our detectives discover that Frank is teleporting in his sleep, endlessly pursued by a grotesque genetic freak which threatens to destroy them all. This masterful rendition marks Koontz's full maturation--and the point at which he displaces Stephen King as America's premier weaver of horror yarns. I've read many horror thrillers by Stephen King & Dean Koontz & others, and loved most of them. This was not one of my favorites. Classic Dean Koontz novel. He blends suspense, science fiction, horror and a little romance to write a superb novel. Action from start to finish. I have read over 45 of his books. This ranks right up there with Watchers, Lightning, Phantoms and Strangers as one of his best novels. It is slightly over 400 pages, but I couldn't put it down. I finished it in 2 days. It is well worth the reading time.

Dean Koontz is one of my favorite authors, I've read many of his books. Some were superb, others..meh. The Bad Place was one of those 'meh' books. I felt his use of violence was overdone, almost as a fill in to lengthen the book. The characters, to me, were superficial, not his usual in depth personality descriptions. I finished the book, but would not recommend.

I am a big fan of Dean Koontz, and have read most of his books. Some, I liked a lot, some not as much, but in general I enjoyed most of them. Not this one. I know you have to have a certain amount of imagination to accept his stories, but some of the premises in this book are completely ridiculous, and to be honest, downright gross. This book is just plain creepy, and not in a good way. There are many good Dean Koontz books out there, pick one of those instead.

This was my first Dean Koontz novel, so I guess I'm just not a fan. It reads like an action movie script. That being said I don't enjoy books that spend pages upon pages describing a scene or feelings either; but this was just way too simplistic for me. I didn't make it more than a few chapters in before I gave up.

Competent audio performances but this is clearly a much earlier Koontz book and lacks the character development and plotting that are seen in his more mature efforts.

But now that I've read it non-stop for a few days I'm too tired to tell you why it was great except to say that if you love a happily married, witty, kick-ass couple, you will love this book.

I have the unabridged format and the narrators are splendid. The story line is Koontz all the way. If I had to read it myself, maybe I wouldn't have gotten as much out of it.
