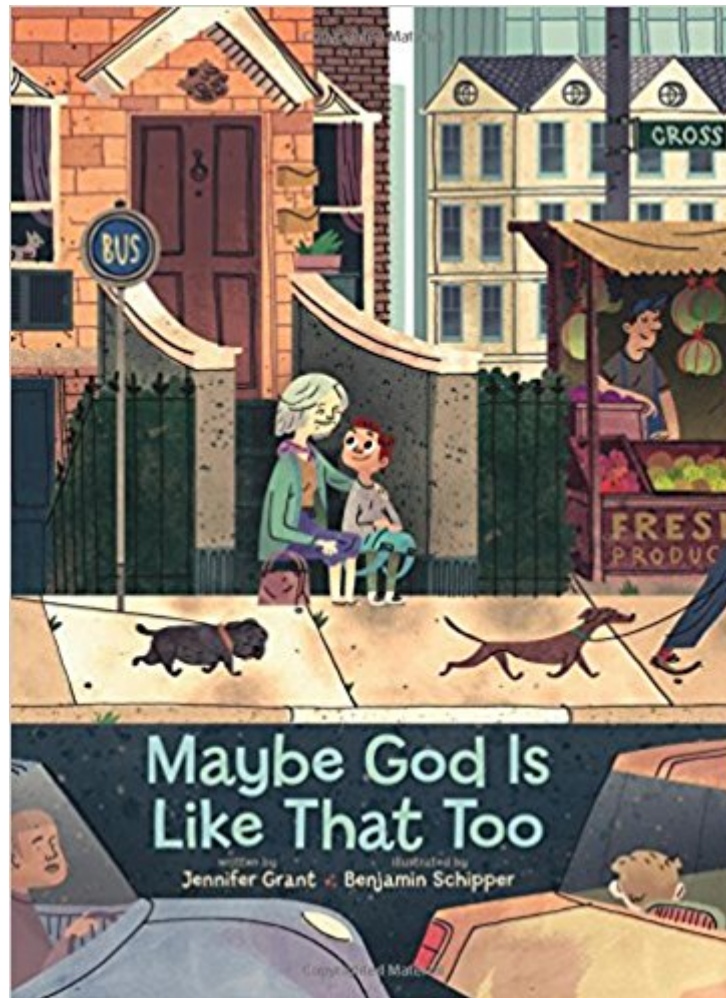

My almost 3 year old loves this story. He wants to read it over and over again and laughs at the little dog in the purple sweater. It's a great way to show him how to look for an invisible God in every day life.

I am pretty particular about children's books, particularly religious children's books. So many have cheesy art and shallow theology. This one is beautiful - aesthetically and spiritually. Very highly recommended for families and churches alike.

On so many levels, this beautiful children's book delivers. First, it is words that real children really use. It begins with the boy saying, "I live in the city but I've never seen God before." Secondly, the boy asks honest questions that we should all be asking, which author Grant does not answer simply. When the boy asks the hard question, "Grandma, does God live in the city?" (As a new grandmother myself, the grandma does not disappoint!) She never misses a beat, "Yes, God is here, you just need to know where to look." Through the boy's eyes, Grant brilliantly proposes that God shows up in everyday folks in everyday messy life. Lastly, it is one of those artfully crafted books meant to spur on the (possibly tired) adult reader who has already read two maybe three books before this one -- at bedtime -- to the kids. Bonus: the umber textured urban life illustrations delightfully enhance the story. It will be in the pile to read again and again to my grandkids.

I just received my copy of "Maybe God is Like That Too" in the mail from today! I LOVE this book! As a Grandma, raising our granddaughter, in the city of Philadelphia, and someone who cares passionately about inviting children and adults to find God in the ordinary moments of life, this book echoes my heart's desire for finding God in our world.
