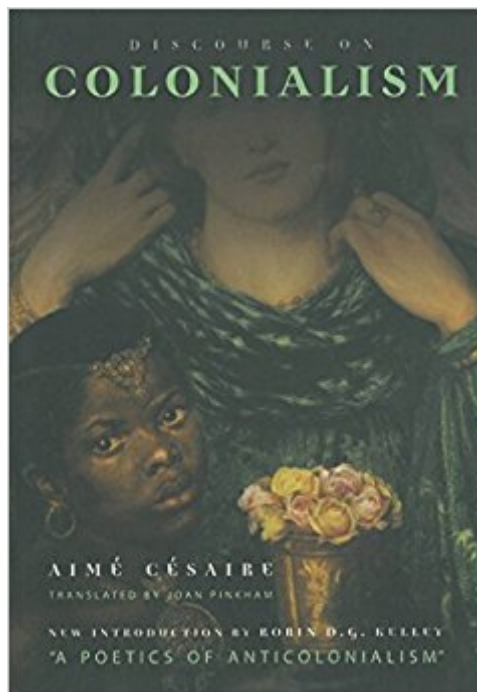

Having read this for a class, I found this to be a thought provoking text on colonialism as seen from the colonized. A scathing rebuke of the practice, in my opinion, and perfect to read when studying the decolonization period.

Fanon's book informs, educate, through frank discussion. "Amazingly" we see some of his concepts and ideologies playing out in society!

What a refreshing re-reading of a book that receded into the background of my first look, many years ago, into the forces of colonial power in the African diaspora. The prose seems to me now more powerfully poetic than I remembered and dangerously insightful of the cultural conditions internal to the making of Europe's colonial rise and demise. A must read for anyone interested in postcolonial discourse and discourses of power.

Although I hoped to get a broader perspective on the subject of colonialism, I was somewhat disappointed in the narrow perspective that I was offered by Césaire. His outlook was as described, a discourse, but from a very personal point of view. The author is first and foremost a poet and his writing reflects that in his approach to the topic. I was hoping for a more detailed historical and/or sociological evaluation of colonialism. Instead, Césaire offered this reader a more personal insight into his own interesting cultural and ethnological understanding of the subject, an evaluation that I appreciated and understood, but which did not further much my insights into the dynamics of colonialism and its underpinnings.
