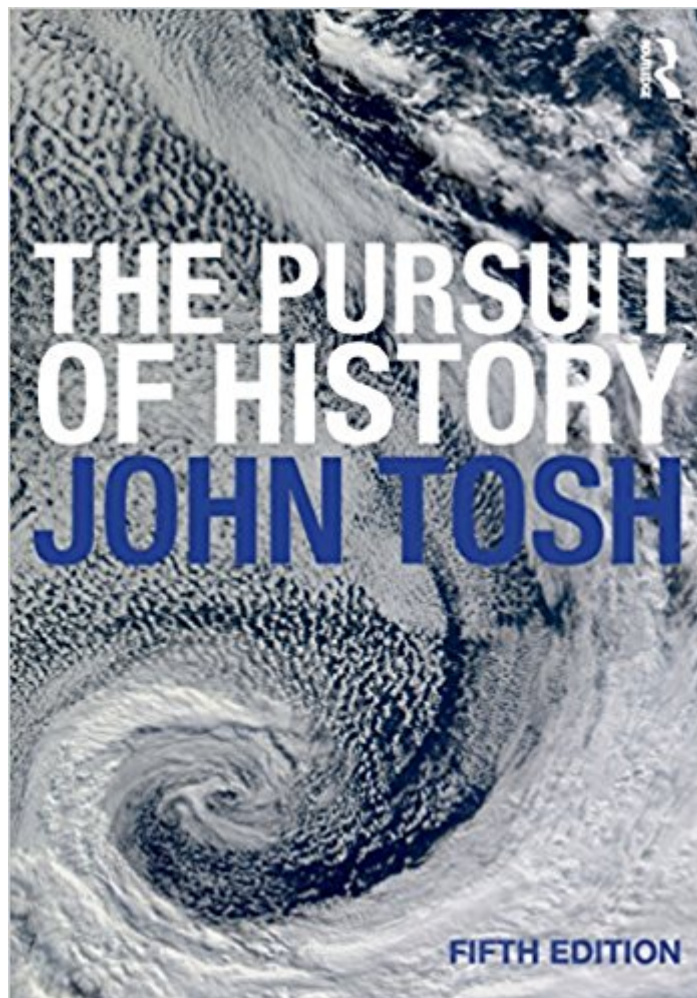

for the horrible vocabulary words on the sides of each page. They are incredibly distracting and have nothing to do with the argument of each section. For instance, a section about questioning "normal," the highlighted term is "abolition of slavery," which wasn't the point of the section, it was merely an example.

This book reminds you of what you should be looking for in sources, and how to find it out. In fact, I wish this was a required book way early in my studies.
